UNICEF stands for the United Nations Children's Fund, which has been working to improve the lives of children and mothers since 1946. It looks for ways to help young people who face great problems and difficulties wherever they are in the world.

One of the most recent problems has been the COVID-19 pandemic, which has changed the world for the worse in many ways. It has, for example, had a negative effect on the way children learn. To slow down the spread of the disease, young people in many countries were told to have classes online. UNICEF numbers state that 1.6 billion children all over the world haven't been able to learn in a traditional way since the start of the pandemic. Many children have, as a result, had difficulties learning how to read, write and count, while for some it has meant no education at all. Now, however, things are changing for the better.

In March 2021, 51 countries decided to return to teaching at school. However, many children still have to learn from home. UNICEF officials have suggested that reopening schools should be a priority for governments. And when schools are finally open, students will need to be helped to return to the 'new' old reality.
